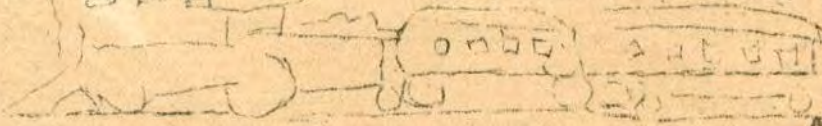
Those intending to make reservations for the bathtubs for the night before should do so early, and also provide pillows and a blanket or two. For further information see student head of Jubilee.

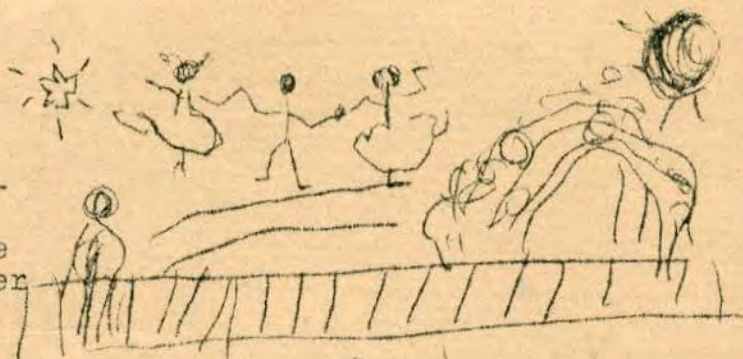

Phi Theta Kappa Meets

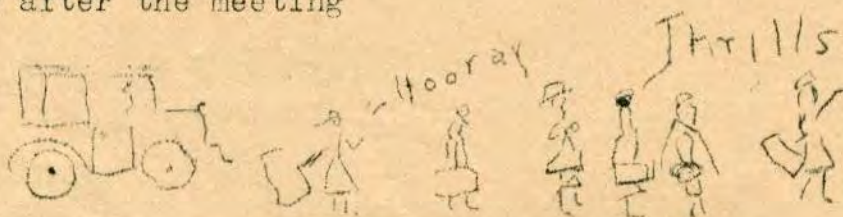
