May Day

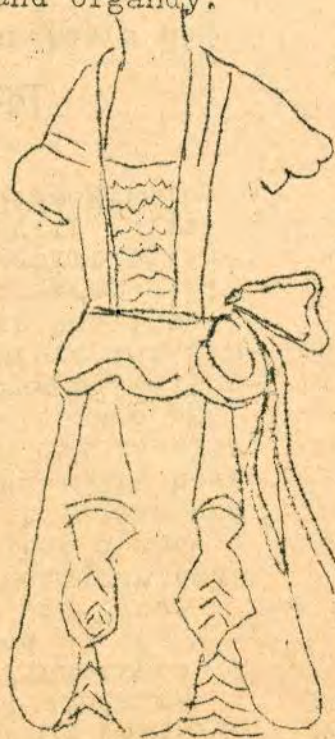
This year May Day will be celebrated May 12th, the seventh anniversary of Dr. and Mrs. Roemer's being at Lindenwood.

Roemer Hall

Roemer Hall will be ready for occupancy by September first this fall. It will be used solely for administrative and educational purposes. The first floor is given over to Domestic Science, Domestic Art, the School of Expression, the Post Office, the stationary and music stores, the superintendent's office, and class rooms.

On the main, or second, floor, is an auditorium with a seating capacity of seven hundred, the Dean of Student's office, the President's office, the Dean of Education's office, the bank and the library. The third floor will be devoted to class rooms, the majority of which will accommodate thirty students. There will be several lecture rooms large enough to seat ninety. The fourth floor will be devoted to science laboratories, the Art Department, and class rooms.

Sibley Hall

Plans have been made for the improvement of Sibley, but Dr. Roemer is doubtful whether or not these plans will be fully carried out this year. A new front porch, colonial, is to be erected, the library will be remodeled into a parlor, and the house mother will have rooms on the first floor. The infirmary will remain in Sibley but many improvements will be made. The remainder of the building will be made into dormitories with as modern conveniences as can be desired. Dr. Roemer hopes that these improvements can be made this summer, but time is limited and the architects fear they will be too busy with the new building to give much time to Sibley.

Field Meet

The new track field will be in use in another few days, and the girls are already preparing for a meet between class track teams to be held in May. Miss Weld is standardizing the records in order that they may be kept from year to year for the sake of comparison with records made at other colleges by women students.

Miss Jackson
